As we look forward to spring, I am constantly reminded of the blessing of Christian Education. A few years ago we developed nine faithlines that we weave into our everyday lessons from PreK-12th grade. Each year we focus a little more intently on one of those faithlines. This year our focus is on Creation Caring from Psalm 24:1 "The earth is the Lord's, and everything in it, the world and all who live in it." We want

the students at Kalamazoo Christian to have a more meaningful understanding of the role they play in caring for God's creation and to appreciate the blessing of nature all around us.

This year, we started a
Nature Preschool program for 3 and 4-year-old students. These students spend half of their day outdoors (rain, snow, or shine) exploring and gaining a deeper appreciation for their surroundings and using nature in their education.
Right before Christmas break, I spent a little time with them in their nature classroom as they participated

in various "centers". One center used leaves,

sticks, and branches for imaginative play. Another rolled dice to place the correct number of ornaments on a Christmas tree. Another center recreated the Christmas story with rocks.

As these students use God's creation to tell stories, play, and learn, they gain a deeper appreciation for the role they play in caring for it. They develop an understanding of what the Lord has given to us and our responsibility to steward it well. As you look through this edition of the Torch, you will read various stories on how our students are actively engaged in creation care.


We have been blessed with great resources on our campuses and it is great to see our teachers and students learn about how we can care for God's creation each and every day.



Welcome Growth

Kalamazoo Christian Schools saw another increase in enrollment this year. While the surge was not as great as last school year's 159 new K-12 students, we still saw significant growth with 138 new K-12 students. Some of our elementary and middle school grades are at full capacity. The 4th-grade classrooms started the year in the library, art room, and other locations until they could move into two large modular buildings (which hold 4 classrooms) that now rest on the grounds of the 12th Street campus.

Kalamazoo Christian Schools pursues a vision that each graduate will become a "disciple who transforms the world." Each year our schools focus intently on one of nine qualities of discipleship (Faithlines). When put into practice, these qualities will develop lifelong disciplines in our students that will impact their character, their relationships, and their world. These nine Faithlines are Beauty Creating, Creation Caring, Faith Nurturing, God Glorifying, Image Reflecting, Justice Seeking, Kingdom Building, Stewardly Living, and Truth Pursuing.

This year's Faithline is Creation Caring. From our new nature preschool to our high school, students are all learning about how to appreciate and care for creation in ways that honor God, the earth, and all who live on it. Our fall all-school chapel unified our K-12 students on the 12th Street campus with a focus on our Creation Caring theme. Older students buddied up with younger students to walk around the outside of the PreK-8 building. Along the way, buddies stopped at numerous Creation Caring stations. At one station, students sang "This Is My Father's World", and at another they finger-painted leaves.

One particularly special station was Mitchell's Bench. Mitchell was a student at KCS from 4th-6th grade. In 8th grade, Mitchell passed away in a tragic accident. Mitchell's classmates honored him by placing a memorial bench outside the school. During the all-school chapel, students had the opportunity to share Mitchell's story and also to notice and thank God for the beautiful creation surrounding Mitchell's Bench.

This special chapel was a great opportunity to participate together in God's Creation as a unified school community. Our hope and prayer are that all of our students develop a life-long love, appreciation, and stewardship of all that God has made.

NEW Nature Preschool

On their first nature walk of the school year, nature preschool teacher Jennifer VanderMolen had her students stop in the middle of the woods and stay completely silent (a tall order for preschoolers!). As they listened closely to the sounds of birds singing, insects chirping, and the wind in the trees, one little boy couldn't stand the five seconds of silence any longer and had to shout out "I hear nature!"

Every day the 3's and 4's nature preschool classes have the privilege to not only hear nature, but also see it, smell it, touch it, and interact with it. Jennifer loves being able to tell kids in their Oaki all-weather suits "Yes, you can touch that bug" or "Yes, you can stomp in that mud puddle". Jennifer and teacher assistant Carlie Southland constantly look for opportunities to use nature as a tool to learn counting, colors, and shapes. "How many bugs do you see under this log?" "Find a yellow leaf." "Make a triangle out of these twigs."

Preschoolers start their day indoors for some quick tabletop time, a check of the weather, and the long process of donning their Oaki suits. Then students trek to their outdoor classroom, which includes white picnic tables, an outdoor play kitchen, stumps, and weather-proof deck boxes with plenty of supplies. Outside this area, meadows, fields, and woods are their bigger classrooms: logs, boulders, a soybean field, and wooded trails all provide countless learning

opportunities for these young minds. An anonymous donor recently gifted a shed for when the class needs to get out of the elements for a while.

Jennifer feels tremendously blessed to teach these young creations about their Creator within a Christian school community. "You can't have a nature preschool without talking about the Creator." When she asks her students

"What is the most important part of God's creation?" kids call out their favorite animals: "Cheetah!" "Dolphin!" "Snake!" What a privilege to be able to remind them, "No, it's you! God made you and you're the best of all His creation."

Students see the beauty of creation, but they also see the brokenness of our world with the death of a caterpillar or a decaying tree. But this provides opportunities to talk about how they can care for God's creation and treat it with gentleness and respect.

The new nature preschool has room to grow. Both classes are at full capacity with a waiting list for next year. Jennifer has dreams of a vegetable garden and a more permanent, weather proof structure. She is grateful for all of the help and support she has received from parents, teachers, and staff. Humility and flexibility have been key: having the humility to ask for help and the flexibility to meet the challenges of unpredictable weather and a brand new program.

Jennifer says she can look back at the end of each day and say, "It was very good." Every day the 4's class also declares God's goodness by singing the hymn "All Things Bright and Beautiful".

The last verse says:

He gave us eyes to see them and lips that we might tell how great is the Almighty who has made all things well.

Spanish Immersion

As a college Spanish instructor for 30 years, a dual language educator in the PreK-12 school system for 20 years, and co-owner of a small business that publishes foreign language learning materials, I peruse articles daily about dual language learning in our country. Too often, I read editorials, articles, and comments about the "negative effects" that dual-language learning could have on our young learners. Nothing could be further from the truth.

No research-based evidence exists showing academic advantages to "English Only" learning. According to the National Center for Learning Disabilities, "Bilingualism does not, in any way, harm a child's intellectual development. In fact, researchers are starting to demonstrate that bilingualism has cognitive benefits."

Young children that study another language develop better problem-solving skills, become more autonomous, and are better able to deal with ambiguities. Their brains are more flexible and they are able to use information in new ways. They are better at listening and resolving conflicts.

And, mull this over: as an adult, you may have cognitive superiority over young children but they are superior learners to you in the domain of language. Once they hit their teen years, their ability to learn a foreign language is drastically reduced.

I came from a monolingual, English-speaking home and absolutely loved foreign languages! My elementary school did not have any dual language programs for children, so I had to wait for high school, where I was allowed to study Spanish, French, and Latin simultaneously.

When I shared with my Dad that I wanted to major in Spanish in college and pursue a master's degree in the language, he was puzzled but supportive. Thanks to his support and my language studies, I've managed to make an excellent living over the year — all because no one ever squashed my desire to study languages.

So, the next time you weigh in on the topic of dual-language learning, stop for a minute and consider all the benefits of exposing a child to another language.

8th Grade Recycling

Heather VanDyke's 8th-grade science class completes a unit on recycling and creation caring at the start of every year, but she notes that each group of students brings a unique focus and perspective on different areas of God's creation. This year, students created unique and innovative recycling-themed projects that were put on display or put to work throughout the middle school building.

One group of students created a bright and colorful recycling container. Since people tend to not see items they become overly familiar with (like a blue or green recycling tub), the students decided to make their container one that commands attention, painting it with bright vibrant colors and creation-themed images. Some students used recyclable materials to make pieces of art. Another created a recycling box that was in use in the classroom with a sign reading "Please wash the food off your plastic." All of the students found practical ways to promote recycling within the school and hopefully took those messages home as well!

Heather shares, "Caring for God's Creation is an attitude that we can learn when we are young and carry with us our whole lives. Like so many things that God asks of us, He wants us to be faithful first in the little things-like picking up our own trash, thinking about things before just throwing them away, choosing what we buy with care-so that we can also be trusted with the big things."

High School Field Trip

On a cool, cloudy October day, students in my Current Issues in Political Science class visited Tiller's International in Scotts, Michigan. The field trip fit well with our unit on Creation Care and the school's theme.

Tiller's International's stated mission is "to collaborate with small-scale farmers in developing countries to improve food security concerns in their communities".

The organization is working on major projects in Senegal, Burkina Faso, and Mozambique. These projects are aimed to

locally source and maintain appropriate agricultural technologies for farmers who are facing challenges from climate change.



An example of how their engineers and development specialists aid local populations is having the local community prioritize their agricultural problems, such as a plow that has the wrong angle because it was designed outside of the region. Tiller's will then think about local resources, infrastructure, culture, local soils and nutrients while helping to design an appropriate plow for that population. Simple modifications to the implements can impact the amount of food production and lessen the amount of human labor. For example, one team of oxen can plow the same amount of land in a day with 2 or 3 people that 20 people would do by hand.

The organization honors local know-how and generations of experience while helping farmers tweak their current technology to meet the needs of their community more efficiently and sustainability. We found that Tiller's International considers all kinds of systems to create and evaluate sustainability, such as marketing, economics, agriculture, gender roles, infrastructure challenges, internal conflict, migration, and climate change. Tiller's International offers college internships and classes to the public interested in their work.

Crossing the Finish Line


Finish Line 2021-2024



The Crossing the Finish Line capital campaign, launched in spring 2021, has raised a total of \$2,666,466 as of late January 2022! The 5K Color Run on August 24, 2021, raised funds and paved the way for the gym's groundbreaking a month later on September 24. We have \$802,678 left to raise in order to completely eliminate our debt and an additional \$214,000 left to raise in order to fully fund the middle school gymnasium project.

Construction on the gym began last fall and students and staff alike eagerly watch the daily progress even during these winter months. Middle school students can't wait to use their brand new gym next fall, and the elementary school students are equally grateful to have an entire gym that they can call their own. A huge thank you to those who have generously donated to our Finishline campaign!

The Kids Auction on Saturday, April 30 will raise funds for tuition assistance through our Annual Fund, which keeps the cost of Christian education affordable for our families. Without the \$400,000 we seek to raise each year, many families would be unable to send their kids to KCS. Conservation and Creation Caring with Cole VanOosten

Cole VanOosten ('15) says no two days are ever really the same as a DNR conservation officer in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Some of his job duties include fisheries and wildlife enforcement; marine, ORV, and snowmobile enforcement; and general law enforcement. Cole also assists people in various emergency situations: search and rescues, active drownings, plane crashes, and medical emergencies. Last May Cole and another Conservation Officer (CO) helped rescue a lost angler and just two months later assisted with the rescue of two boaters on Lake Huron.

While he may not have a "typical day" on the job, he definitely practices creation caring principles on a daily basis. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources' mission statement reflects these principles, stating it is "committed to the conservation, protection, management, use and enjoyment of the state's natural and cultural resources for current and future generations."

Reflecting on his formative years at KCS, Cole shares, "I feel like every teacher influenced me positively in one way or another." He says that high school science teachers Steve Dyk and Jeff Offringa had the greatest impact on him in the area of creation caring. "Not only did they teach me a lot about the sciences and how the natural processes work together, but they also did it from a biblical point of view, which I am still grateful for to this day."

One of Cole's favorite memories at KCHS was "executing possibly the greatest senior prank in Kalamazoo Christian history." He and his buddies bought a car off of Craig's List and put it on the roof of the high school, along with an 18-foot statue of then principal, B.J. Huizinga. He also has fond memories of the trip to Kenya with THE Mr. Steve Dyk.

Following graduation in 2015, Cole studied Fisheries and Wildlife Management at Lake Superior State University in Sault Ste. Marie. He was accepted into the Conservation Officer Academy at the end of his junior year. At the Academy, Cole completed a year-long training to become a CO. His class started with 32 recruits and ended with only 23 officers. While the training was rigorous, Cole shares that a high standard is important, as COs often work alone. But he is also grateful for the great officers he works with who assist with enforcement and emergency situations.

Cole says that the year-long CO training and probationary period was the most challenging but also one of the most rewarding experiences of his life. The most enjoyable aspects of his job are being able to help others and also help protect the natural resources that are threatened by overuse and illegal activity. He also enjoys being outdoors pretty much every day, having a flexible schedule so that he can spend time with his wife Ashley (Miller, '14) married in April 2019.

Cole's career lives out the creation-caring theme at KCS. "As a CO, you really get to see the negative impacts that improper use of natural resources can cause. We are fortunate enough to have the opportunity to protect resources that can't protect themselves, and it is an honor to do so."



Habitat for Humanity Retiree Dirk Holkeboer



Dirk Holkeboer ('73) retired from his 33-year career with Habitat for Humanity on June 30, 2021. During his time with Habitat, Dirk served as the executive director of three local chapters (Miami, FL, Holland, MI, Visalia, CA) and worked for Habitat for Humanity International as the Assistant Director of Habitat's annual Jimmy Carter Work Projects and as an affiliate consultant.

After graduation from KCHS, Dirk attended Calvin College ('77) and received a J.D. degree from Wayne State University. Before joining Habitat for Humanity at its headquarters in

Georgia, Dirk worked for a federal judge and for the law firm of Miller Canfield.

"I did not start out with a sense of calling for affordable housing when I joined Habitat in 1988 but came to realize the importance of a 'decent place to live' to developing the stability and strength of low-income families and to the health of our communities."

A May 18, 2021 article in The Sentinel of Hanford, CA noted, "Holkeboer's leadership was put to the test during COVID-19, where social distancing measures had to be taken in order to work effectively. Starting in June 2020, they were building under the new guidelines. This meant coordinating 75 volunteers building a house from the ground up while ensuring all were masked, standing apart when possible, and having the necessary sanitation stations in place at all times."

Dirk and his wife, Betsy Murphy, live in Visalia, California. When they moved to Visalia in 2002, Dirk was surprised to find that one of his favorite high school teachers, Rev. Herman Minnema, also had made the move to California where his son Murray lived. They enjoyed a couple of delightful visits before Rev. Minnema passed away several years ago.
